### A letter from the Chair

To our donors,

On the behalf of the RACS Foundation for Surgery, I would like to express my sincere gratitude for your support throughout 2023. This past year has once again endured many challenges with global economic and financial troubles, cost of living stress, conflicts, as well as the financial sustainability issues faced by RACS which has impacted our members. However, because of the generosity of our donors and their support, the Foundation for Surgery has been able to fund activities allowing access to surgical care, to those who need it in Australia, Aotearoa New Zealand, and in the Pacific Region; education and mentoring; and scholarships and grants.

Over the past year, the Foundation has been able to support and assist with a number of projects through the RACS Global Health program. The incredible achievements of the Global Health program and are outlined further in the report.

The Foundation has supported the Indigenous and Māori communities in Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand, respectively, by providing funding for the coordination and hosting of the Indigenous Health Hui in March 2023, and the production of a video from the Indigenous Health program at the 2023 RACS Annual Scientific Congress.

The Foundation for Surgery Committee has been working through its 2022-2024 Strategic Plan. In June 2023, the Foundation implemented a new donation platform which is more user friendly, open to anyone wishing to donate, and reduces the barriers that donors had found when donating through the previous process. The Committee has also limited the amount of printing and physical material sent to donors and moved predominantly to electronic messages. This was done is response to requests by donors, as well as being mindful to reduce the environmental impact and cost save.

This year, the Foundation for Surgery Committee said farewell to its Philanthropic and Engagement Co-Ordinator, Vanessa Bramfitt; and welcomed Sue Pleass, as Program Lead, Scholarships and Grants. Sue will be responsible for establishing and managing the scholarships and grants from the Foundation for Surgery side and leading engagement with donors of scholarships and grants.

## **Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Maori Health**

### Indigenous Health Hui, 2023

The Foundation for Surgery provided funding to the Indigenous Health Committee to co-ordinate and host the Indigenous Health Hui. The Hui was held in Auckland, Aotearoa New Zealand in March 2023. Fifty Australian First Nation and Aotearoa Maori delegates attended. The aim of the event was for delegates to workshop content, program proposals and Indigenous Health Strategies derived from learnings of the past and present. Information from the hui will be used to plan future changes required to building the indigenous surgical workforce and addressing indigenous health inequities

### Te Rau Poka: Maori Surgical Trainee Academy

Since 2021, the Foundation for Surgery has provided funding support for the co-ordination of the Maori Surgical Trainee Academy. In August 2023, the Foundation for Surgery Committee agreed to continue supporting this for another three years. The objective of this academy is to develop a surgical pathway to increase recruitment of Maori into surgical training, ensure successful qualification, and provide early career support. the academy identifies Maori at secondary school, university and in junior medical roles and assists them to develop skills and competencies facilitating entry and successful passage through SET training.

### Video Production

Funding was given to the Indigenous Health team to document and produce a video of the indigenous Health program at the 2023 RACS Annual Scientific Congress. The video took a narrative approach to capture the significance of the program, and will be able to be used, along with cut shorts and reels, for use inpromotion activities, an asset for promulgation of Indigenous Health, as well as an opportunity to tell the story of Indigenous Health in Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand more broadly than before.

- 19 Visiting Medical Teams were deployed in 2023 composed of surgeons, anaesthetists, nurses, audiologists and deployed across 13 countries to work in partnership with national clinicians and patients.
- 1,100 clinical consultations provided to patients with more than 500 patients receiving life changing surgical procedures.
- 15 nurses from the Pacific Region graduating with a Post Graduate Certificate in Peri-Operative Nursing from Australian College of Nursing.

- 18 accredited training courses have been provided to 288 national clinicians, including Advanced Paediatric Life Support (APLS), Early Management of Severe Trauma (EMST) and Care of the Critically III Surgical Patient (CCrISP).
- 17 Indo-Pacific clinicians received endoscopy training from Australia New Zealand Gastroenterology Training Association (ANZGITA) and Fiji National University (FNU) funded through RACS Global Health.
