We have been hard at work over January and there is an extensive schedule of activities for 2025 planned beginning with an online hui on March 11 with members of the Māori Health Advisory Group – we want to hear from you – whats going well, whats not and how we can help. Currently 34 SET trainees whakapapa Māori with between 4-8 scheduled to complete Training annually in the next 5 years. Thirty four surgeons whakapapa Māori as of January 2025. Kaimanaaki – Counselling Services

Last year Te Rau Poka commissioned research by Dr Nasya Thompson (Ngāti Raukawa) who investigated the supports and barriers for Māori surgical trainees, house officers and medical students. This research findings were consistent with a report recently released by Otago and Auckland University on racism, discrimination and bullying experience by Māori medical students.¹

The findings were informative and have led to the further development of support mechanisms for medical students and surgical trainees. Di Waters (Kai Tahu, Kāti Mamoe, Waitaha, Ngāti Kahungunu) will be returning this year to provide counselling and support for the Te Rau Poka academy. It represents a core value in Māori culture, which emphasises the importance of striving for excellence and maintaining a balanced way of life. This concept can be understood through the pūrākau (legend) of the acquisition of knowledge by Tāne Nui A Rangi.

Te Rau Poka provides support and guidance to Māori interested in surgical careers, creating a pipeline of tauira (students) from secondary school onwards to surgical leadership roles.
