Surgery continues to be a popular career choice amongst prevocational doctors. In 2022, RACS received 799 applications with 284 offers made for training commencing in 2023.

This Guide provides those interested in surgical training a general overview of the RACS selection processes for the nine specialties.

RACS Overview

RACS' purpose is to promote excellence in surgical training and practice in Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand.

RACS represents around 6,700 Surgeons and 1,300 surgical Trainees and Specialist International Medical Graduates.

Training is offered in nine surgical specialties through the Surgical Education and Training (SET) program:

- **Cardiothoracic Surgery**
- **General Surgery**
- Neurosurgery
- **Orthopaedic Surgery**
- Otolaryngology, Head and Neck Surgery
- **Paediatric Surgery**
- **Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery**
- Urology
- **Vascular Surgery**

RACS conducts selection, training and assessment to ensure that Trainees become competent surgeons who provide safe, comprehensive surgical care of the highest standard.

Values

The values at RACS are the strong beliefs of our organisation. They describe the way in which our Fellows, Trainees and staff behave, interact and work together and determine the culture of the College. Our values are held in high regard by everyone within the organisation.



How do I become a Surgeon in Australia and **Aotearoa New Zealand?**

To become a surgeon, you must first complete a medical degree and gain general medical registration to be able practise as a doctor in Australia or Aotearoa New Zealand.


Although your ability to apply is not linked to a postgraduate year (PGY) level, doctors in PGY3 and beyond have typically achieved the prerequisites required. As requirements for each individual speciality differs, ensure you check the specific requirements outlined by the speciality you are applying for.

If your application to enter the SET program is successful, you will train in one of the nine surgical specialties. This training occurs primarily in public hospitals and usually takes between four and seven years, depending on the specialty.

Upon successful completion of all the SET program requirements, you can then apply to become a Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons (FRACS) and will be accredited to practise independently as a consultant surgeon.

RACS Competencies

The SET program is underpinned by ten RACS competencies.



On the SET program, you will be expected to progress during training against each of the competencies. Further details on the RACS competencies are available on the RACS website and in the Becoming a Competent and Proficient Surgeon booklet.

Pathways to surgical training

JDocs by RACS

RACS has developed the Junior Doctors (JDocs) Framework and ePortfolio to progressively guide prevocational doctors through the required skills, knowledge, and behaviours to achieve and demonstrate during postgraduate year levels. Engagement with JDocs will assist in your development towards a career in surgery. The JDocs ePortfolio gives you access to:

- eLearning modules relevant to pre-vocational doctors
- Generic Surgical Science Examination (GSSE) resources
- Online surgical skills logbook (MALT) and Key Clinical Tasks
- Selected RACS library resourcesA platform to progressively assemble evidence of your achievements, work-based assessments and experiences, which can help support application to proceduralist specialty training.

Essential Surgical Skills (ESS)

RACS has produced a Guide to Essential Surgical Skills, recommending the surgical skills to achieve before applying for the SET program.

This guide is useful for:

- medical students and pre-vocational doctors to build a portfolio in preparation for application to the SET program
- hospital supervisors to assist in providing relevant clinical experiences for residents intending to apply for the SET program
- educators to assist in developing learning resources relevant to SET.

The JDocs website contains a selection of free surgical skills videos that are used in the RACS Australian and New Zealand Surgical Skills Education and Training (ASSET) course. The videos demonstrate instrument handling, standard precautions, suturing, knot tying and incisions / excisions. You have the option to purchase an essential surgical skills kit to enable practice of the skills demonstrated in the videos.

Indigenous Scholarships Program

RACS also offers an Indigenous Scholarship Program to support medical graduates who identify as Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander or Māori, on their chosen career path to becoming a Surgeon.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Selection Initiative

Indigenous people are under-represented in the health workforce of Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand. To meet the needs of all Australian and Aotearoa New Zealand communities, the surgical workforce needs greater representation from Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander and Māori peoples.

RACS' Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Surgical Trainee Selection Initiative is designed to address the low participation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander doctors in the surgical specialties.

Individual Specialty Training Boards may implement a selection initiative to expand opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders to enter training. Specialties may set aside posts for applicants who in the registration stage:

- identify as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander,
- meet the eligibility requirements for membership of Australian Indigenous Doctors' Association (AIDA) and
- meet the minimum standards for appointment as defined by the Specialty Training Board.

The Indigenous Health Committee is working with the Australian Indigenous Doctors' Association (AIDA) and the Maori Medical Practitioners Association of Aotearoa (Te ORA) to promote surgery as a career to Indigenous doctors. Australian – Indigenous Surgical Pathways (AISP)

The AISP Program aims to reduce the professional health workforce inequity faced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Australia.

It is a long-term, multi-pronged initiative that recognises the need to support those wishing to contribute to health equity for First Australians. The solution is, in part, changing culture to honour the rights and value the amazing contributions First Australians have to offer.

The AISP pilot project is being led by the Royal Darwin Hospital. Health service, departmental and mentorship standards will be defined and, ultimately, a package will be developed to be introduced and applied Australia-wide.

Rural Health Equity Strategic Action Plan

RACS acknowledges its social responsibility to address health inequity through its levers of selecting, training, retaining, and collaborating for rural surgical services and rural communities. It's well known that rural people have poorer health outcomes than urban people. They have all kinds of surgical problems which need the care of all kinds of surgeons.

The RACS Rural Health Equity Strategy aims to improve health equity for remote, rural, and regional/provincial people in Australia and New Zealand. The strategy embeds actions for rural health equity in all RACS activities and across all specialties.

SET Selection

SET Selection Process

Information about SET selection published in November each year. The selection of SET trainees is an annual competitive process that commences in January and finishes in September for most specialities. The selection process for each specialty has at least five stages. The order of these may vary between specialties.

Registration	January (all specialties)
Application	• February - March •refer to Specialty Selection regulations for exact dates
Referee Reporting	April - May refer to Specialty Selection regulations for exact dates
Semi-structured interviews	June - July refer to Specialty Selection regulations for exact dates
Announcement of offers	• July - November

Registration and Application Fees

You must register every year if you wish to submit an application for selection that year. There is a nonrefundable fee payable at the time of registration (which covers all specialties you have registered for).

Each application for Selection (to each individual surgical specialty) will then incur a separate nonrefundable fee. Fees for applications accepted through the RACS online application form are available on the RACS website. All other specialities will publish their own selection processing fees on their webpages.

Registration

Online Registration Form

To apply for the SET program, you must register your interest via the online RACS portal each year. No registrations are accepted after the published closing date.

Note: the Online Registration Form is only available during the selection registration period.

The Online Registration Form captures:

- your contact details
- evidence that you have meet the generic eligibility requirements for SET Selection
- the surgical specialties that you would like to apply to

Registration for Specialties with Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand

There is no limit to the number of specialties you can select at the registration stage. You are not required to submit an application for all the specialties you register for however if you have not registered for a particular specialty, you cannot submit an application for it in the current selection year. Some surgical specialties limit the number of applications that you can submit (if this is the case, it will be documented in the relevant specialty selection regulations and has been included in the specialty selection pages later in this Guide).

If a specialty has separate selection processes for Australian and Aotearoa New Zealand (e.g. General Surgery), you can only apply for selection in one country and must nominate which one in your registration form.

Criminal Checks

Criminal conduct will not be considered during the selection process if AHPRA / MCNZ has been notified and unconditional medical registration is maintained.

Eligibility Requirements

To meet registration requirements, you **must** fulfil the **generic** (and **specialty specific** if applicable) eligibility criteria at the time you submit your registration.

The generic eligibility requirements that all applicants to **all** specialties must meet are:

Generic Eligibility criteria	
You must have permanent residency or citizenship of Australia or Aotearoa New Zealand at the time of registration	Permanent (non-citizen) residents of Aotearoa New Zealand are not automatically entitled to residential approval in Australia. If you are a non-citizen Aotearoa New Zealand resident and you apply for a program with Australian rotations, you will be responsible for securing a visa
	In the event that a visa cannot be obtained no special arrangements can be made, and the offer of a place on the program may be withdrawn, or the trainee dismissed
	From 1 October 2019, if you hold an Australian permanent resident visa, you will need to hold an NZeTA (New Zealand Electronic Travel Authority) prior to travelling to New Zealand.
	Australian passport holders are not required to have a NZeTA
You must have general (unconditional) registration in Australia or general scope registration in Aotearoa New Zealand	
You must have completed either the RACS Operating with Respect eLearning Module OR the RACS Introduction to Operating with Respect eLearning Module.	The Introduction to Operating with Respect eLearning module replaced the Operating with Respect module in September 2023. Applicants need to complete only one of these.

Application for Selection to the SET Program

Selection Instruments

In 1998 RACS endorsed the Best Practice Framework for Trainee Selection that subsequently became known as the Brennan Principles. Each of the nine surgical specialities administers its own selection processes using a range of selection tools. The weighting of these tools must be reasonable and fair to all applicants. These weightings are determined prior to the commencement of the selection process and are published in the specialty selection regulations.

To improve the quality and effectiveness of the SET selection process, RACS conducts research and evaluates the performance of selection instruments and processes. Research and evaluation may include 'pilot' implementation of selection instruments or processes to study their utility in the RACS context. Applicants to SET may be invited to participate in selection research or evaluation.

If you have registered for selection and have been confirmed as satisfying the generic eligibility requirements, you may submit an application for selection with the relevant specialty/specialties. All applications must be made using the online application form between the published opening and closing dates.

- Cardiothoracic Surgery
- Otolaryngology Head and Neck Surgery New Zealand
- Paediatric Surgery
- Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery New Zealand

Online Application Form

Irrespective of which specialty you are applying for, you must provide:

- contact details for referees
- evidence to show that you meet the minimum eligibility criteria

a structured Curriculum Vitae (CV) which captures information and evidence of:

- surgical experience
- other qualifications
- publications and presentations
- skills courses
- medical achievements
- leadership exposure

You should also read the current selection regulations for the relevant speciality/specialties you are applying for to ensure that you meet the minimum eligibility requirements.

Generic Surgical Sciences Examination (GSSE)

All specialties require you to have passed the RACS Generic Surgical Sciences Exam (GSSE) either at the time of registration or by the close of SET applications. This exam is designed to ensure that you demonstrate a minimum standard of knowledge in the surgical sciences of anatomy, pathology and physiology - the foundation of surgical training. Passing the GSSE requires demonstration of this 'minimum standard' of knowledge in each discipline as well as sound knowledge 'across the board'.

Clinical Examination (CE)

The Clinical Examination (CE) is a practical examination designed to the clinical application of the basic sciences. The emphasis of the Clinical Examination is on the application of basic science knowledge and understanding and clinical practise relevant to all forms of surgery.

You will spend five minutes at each of the 16 assessed stations. Examples of tasks assessed include patient history taking and examination, demonstration of practical technical skill, the application of basic science knowledge, data acquisition and analysis, counselling and communication skills.

The Clinical Examination has transitioned to a selection prerequisite for some surgical specialties. Please refer to their selection webpages and selection regulations for further details.

Structured Referee Reports

You will be asked to name a number of referees in your application form. Referees are then selected, and reference reports collected in accordance with the relevant specialty-specific regulations.

Information collected in the referee reports include applicant clinical aptitude, workplace behaviour, and personal attributes.

Semi-Structured interviews

Once the Referee Reporting stage has closed, CV and Referee Report scores are combined. Should you achieve the minimum standard (this varies depending on the specialty) then you will be invited to interview by the Specialty Board. You will be given at least 10 days' notice of the interview date.

Announcement of Offers

All applications will be classified as one of the below:

an eligible applicant who satisfied the minimum standards for selection and in the Successful

ranking of combined weighted scores of all applicants for the specialty, scored high

enough to be made an offer

an eligible applicant who satisfied the minimum standards for selection but who did Unsuccessful

not rank high enough in comparison to other applicants to be made an offer

an applicant who failed to satisfy a minimum standard for selection Unsuitable

If you are offered a position on any of the speciality training programs you must accept within the nominated timeframe or the offer will be automatically rescinded.

If your application is not successful, the Speciality Board will notify you in writing of your outcome and will provide feedback.


The number of Trainees offered a place on the SET program is determined by each Speciality Training Committee / Board. The number of places available each year varies and may be dependent on:

- the number of accredited hospital training posts available the following year
- the number of current trainees that have applied for interruption and research for the following vear
- the number of current trainees applying for fellowship


Applications and Offers to Cardiothoracic Surgery between 2019 and 2023






The selection process uses 4 selection tools, each contributing the following weightings to the overall selection score out of 100:

- Structured Curriculum Vitae 10%
- Neurosurgery Anatomy Examination 30%
- Reference Report 30%
- Semi-Structured Interview 30%



Applications and Offers to Orthopaedic Surgery (Aotearoa New Zealand) between 2019 and 2023







Plastic & Reconstructive Surgery (Aotearoa New **Zealand)**






Vascular Surgery





Appendix Three: Selection Checklist

Before submitting an application for the Surgical Education and Training Program, make sure you check the list below and complete all 10 items.

Hold General Medical Registration without conditions from the Medical Board of Australia (MBA) or the Medical Council of New Zealand (MCNZ)
Be a citizen or permanent resident of Australia or Aotearoa New Zealand
Select surgical specialty (or specialties) for which to apply to SET
Check the <u>RACS website</u> for current SET Program information and specialty-specific eligibility requirements
Successfully pass the Generic Surgical Sciences Examination (in accordance with the deadline for this requirement in relevant specialty-specific selection regulations)
Complete the RACS Introduction to Operating with Respect eLearning Module
Register for SET Selection in January (fee payable)
Prepare documentation for SET application (list of rotations, contact details of supervisors/referees, evidence of qualifications, publications and achievements)
