

# **Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Māori Health**

### **Global Health**



Working with local partners, volunteer specialists address sight, hearing, and mobility as well as many other critical needs.

**Investing in people.** Volunteer specialists train local surgeons and health professionals in order to support increased healthcare capacity and meet the ongoing needs of low-income communities within the Asia-Pacific Region.
