COAG National Medical Workforce Strategy forums

Committee

The Australian Commonwealth Department of Health held three COAG strategy forums to engage medical professionals in the development of a national approach to medical workforce planning and policy development. Committee members were busy representing RACS and rural surgery at the Sydney, Mount Gambier and Perth forums.

We encourage the Government to hold similar forums in other states and territories to understand the unique set of workforce maldistribution issues faced by each region.

Key changes within the Health Workforce Program - Modified Monash Model classification update



From 1 July 2019, updates to the geographical classifications used in health workforce programs will be available on the DoctorConnect <u>website</u>. The Modified Monash Model classification will be used to determine eligibility for a range of health workforce programs including the Rural Bulk Billing Incentive.

External representations

In addition to representing rural surgery at forums, committee members have been actively promoting rural surgery at external conferences.

I presented on the topic of Equity, Collectivism and Effective Altruism; Solutions for increasing ENT care in rural and remote Australia to the Australian Society of Otolaryngology Head and Neck Surgery Annual Scientific Meeting. Past Chair Dr Sally Butcher presented on rural surgical pathways and support offered for rural medical students and doctors interested in surgery and rural practice at the <u>15th National Rural</u> Health Conference. I also discussed rural specialist career choices and pathways at the Victorian Rural Health Conference as a presenter and panellist.

STP support projects

We have been involved in development of various STP support projects at the College which aim to enhance rural training networks. The first project initiative will be identifying the barriers and challenges for the application and continuation of rural surgical training. The second project proposal will focus on clinical research opportunities in the rural hospitals for STP funded trainees.

We acknowledge the Professional Development and Research & Evaluation Departments for spearheading these initiatives.

Rural Coach program – Clinical Director

The <u>Rural Coach Program</u> have been providing support and mentoring to surgical trainees since its establishment in 2011.

The Program is led by the new Clinical Director Dr Damian Fry. Based in Queensland, he was recently conferred his Fellowship in General Surgery at the Bangkok 2019 ASC and is very happy to have contact with any Trainees considering a rural surgical career. The Program also offers grants to attend the annual Provincial Surgeons of Australia conference.
