Associate Professor Philip McCahy is the Clinical Director of VASM. He is a benign urologist at Monash Health and in Gippsland. ## Dr Bibhusal Thapa, FRACS and Surgical Quality Committee Member, Northern Health

Dr Bibhusal Thapa is a Thoracic surgeon and a member of the surgical quality team of the Surgical Division of Northern Health since August 2020. Dr Thapa completed his undergraduate study, post-graduate training in general surgery in Nepal and then specialty training in Thoracic surgery. In 2010, Dr Thapa received the Rowan Nicks Scholarship which allowed him to undertake fellowship training in Thoracic Surgery in Melbourne.
